Misinformation and disinformation on climate change are growing and are one of the major obstacles inhibiting or delaying progress in tackling the issue. The objective of this session is to enhance the capacity of participants to counter misleading information around climate change. It provides the means to identify climate mis/disinformation and the techniques being used to distract action on climate change. It also goes through tools from image and footage verification to document analysis and corroboration. Through exercises, participants will use these methods to analyse climate mis/disinformation.

This session will focus on the steps required to pursue climate investigations with corporations as the focus. It will set out several methods for finding stories in data, reports and from specific sources. It will then use case studies to explain the major techniques for digging into these leads, through analysing financial documents, sustainability reports, and understanding information from free sources such as stock exchange terminals, SEC filings and EDGAR.

Sam Leon is co-founder of <u>Data Desk</u>, an investigative consultancy focused on climate and the commodities industry. He previously worked at Global Witness where he ran their digital investigations unit.

Tais Gadea Lara

Tais Gadea Lara is a climate journalist from Argentina. Since 2014 she has been covering the climate negotiations and international politics. In 2024 she was a Climate Explorer at the Constructive Institute (Denmark) working on a global project to help journalists improve climate reporting. She is the author of the newsletter Planeta, coordinates a Climate Book Club, gives workshops on climate communication to multiple audiences, and collaborates in different media. Her work has appeared in Devex, InfoAmazonia, National Geographic, Climática La Marea, Canal de la Ciudad, among others. In 2020, she created the Environmental Journalism Workshop to train more people in the communication of the climate and ecological crisis. She was recognised as one of the 100 Latinos most committed to climate action for several years.

Tom Sanderson

Tom Sanderson is the Deputy Director of the Centre for Investigative Journalism. He joined the CIJ in 2014 as Training Coordinator and now oversees all aspects of the CIJ's training provision and leads on the development of funded projects and initiatives.
